Early Childhood and Kindergarten:

This week's lesson is about careers. Typically we would be doing a unit on careers doing this time of the school year. For our youngest Simbas, that simply means we talk about different kinds of jobs and what they entail.

What Do You Want to Be When You Grow Up?

Start by asking your child this question! You might be surprised by what their answer is! Children generally only know about a handful of jobs, such as teacher, nurse and police officer. You can use this video to start a conversation about some jobs that they would not think of on their own:
